#### 1. Information and scope of inspection

This section tells you about the type, accommodation, neighbourhood, age and construction of the property. It also tells you about the extent of the inspection and highlights anything that the surveyor could not inspect.

All references to visual inspection refer to an inspection from within the property without the need to move any obstructions and externally from ground level within the site and adjoining public areas. Any references to left or right are taken facing the front of the property.

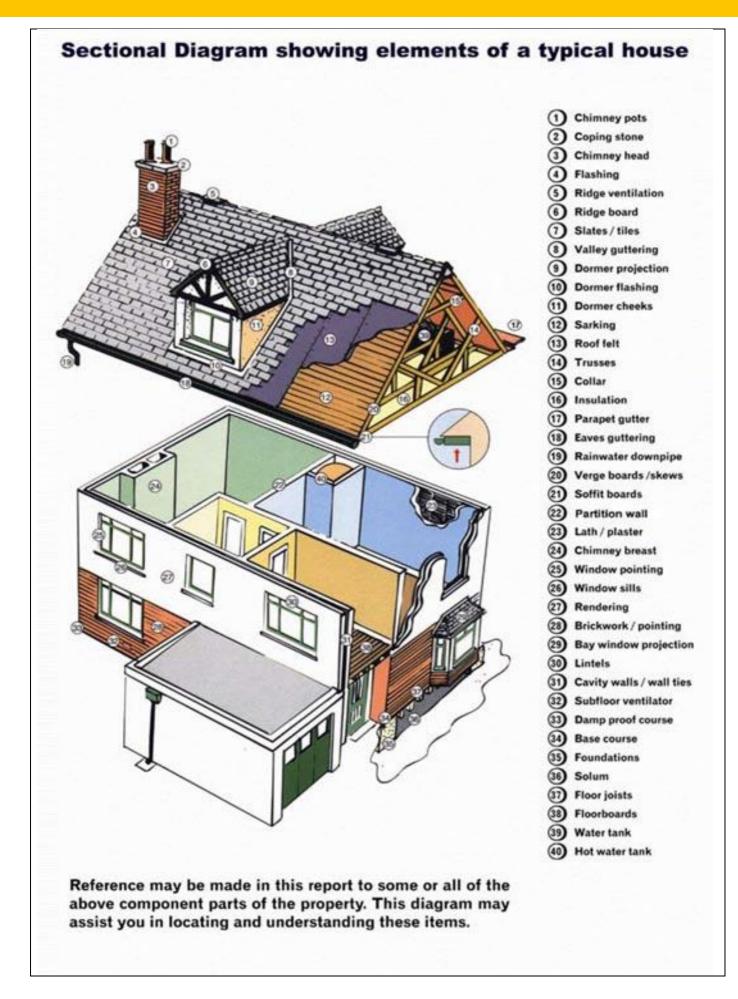
The inspection is carried out without causing damage to the building or its contents and without endangering the occupiers or the surveyor. Heavy furniture, stored items and insulation are not moved. Unless identified in the report the surveyor will assume that no harmful or hazardous materials or techniques have been used in the construction. The presence or possible consequences of any site contamination will not be researched.

Services such as TV/cable connection, internet connection, swimming pools and other leisure facilities etc were not inspected or reported on.

Description	A semi-detached dwelling house. The property was built by the local authority.
Accommodation	Ground floor: entrance porch, inner lobby, living room and a kitchen. First floor: landing, 2 bedrooms and a bathroom. Second floor: landing and a bedroom.
Gross internal floor area (m <sup>2</sup> )	88 sq m
Neighbourhood and location	The property is set within the established social housing area close to the centre of Fort William. Most adjoining properties are now in private ownership. All essential services, amenities and transport links are nearby.
Age	Built around 1954. The attic was converted around 10 years ago.
Weather	Overcast with outbreaks of rain. The preceding weather was similar.
Chimney stacks	Visually inspected with the aid of binoculars where appropriate There is a masonry constructed communal chimney stack at the party wall which serves a stove to the living room. The stack is rendered and topped in a concrete cope with clay pots. There are lead flashings with the main roof.
Roofing including roof space	Sloping roofs were visually inspected with the aid of binoculars where appropriate Flat roofs were visually inspected from vantage points within the property and where safe and reasonable to do so from a 3 m ladder externally Roof spaces were visually inspected and were entered where there was safe and reasonable access,
	normally defined as being from a 3 m ladder within the property If this is not possible, then physical access to the roof space may be taken by other means if the Surveyor deems it safe and reasonable to do so The roof is pitched and clad in a natural slate. The ridge is in a concrete or clay tile. There are Velux rooflights to the front and rear. There are lead valleys at the roof intersection with the adjoining property.
	Due to the extent of the second floor/attic conversion remaining roof spaces are very limited. We viewed part of the roof space to the rear via an inspection hatch to the cupboard. The roof is of joiner made construction. There is glass wool insulation in places.
Rainwater fittings	Visually inspected with the aid of binoculars where appropriate Cast iron gutters and downpipes.
Main walls	Visually inspected with the aid of binoculars where appropriate Foundations and concealed parts were not exposed or inspected External walls are in cavity brickwork construction (2 walls with a narrow gap between). The outer wall is finished in a dry dash render. Internal surfaces are in a plaster on the hard or later plasterboard.
Windows, external doors and joinery	Internal and external doors were opened and closed where keys were available Random windows were opened and closed where possible Doors and windows were not forced open Windows are in timber frame and casement with sealed double glazed panels. The front and rear entrance doors are in replacement upvc. There are no other external joinery elements as the eaves and soffits are in masonry construction.

	Using a moisture meter, walls were randomly tested for dampness where considered appropriate Plastered masonry or timber frame with plasterboard linings.

	Sub-floor areas were inspected only to the extent visible from a readily accessible and unfixed hatch by way of an inverted "head and shoulders" inspection at the access point
	Physical access to the sub floor area may be taken if the Surveyor deems it is safe and reasonable to do so, and subject to a minimum clearance of 1 m between the underside of floor joists and the solum as determined from the access hatch
	Floors are in suspended timber (boarded joists) with the exception of the kitchen which is in solid concrete. Floors were fully covered and carpeted at the time of inspection. We were unable to view the sub floor space.
Internal joinery and kitchen	Built in cupboards were looked into but no stored items were moved
fittings	<i>Kitchen units were visually inspected excluding appliances</i> Facings and skirtings are in timber. Internal doors are in oak panel . The stair is original in two flights with quarter landing. There is a newer stair to the second floor. There are timber balustrades and newel posts.
	Kitchen fittings comprise of a proprietary range of modern plastic faced base and wall units with a plastic coated door, proprietary worktop, inset sink and integral gas hob and oven housing.

fireplaces	No testing of the flues or fittings were carried out The chimney breast is in a plaster on the hard. The fireplace opening to the living room houses a solid fuel stove.
Internal decorations	Visually inspected Ceilings and walls are in emulsion paint on a plain plaster/board, lining or lightly embossed paper. Internal joinery is painted or varnished.
Cellars	Visually inspected where there was a safe and purpose built access None

Electricity	Accessible parts of the wiring were visually inspected without removing fittings. No tests whatsoever were carried out to the system or appliances. Visual inspection does not assess any services to make sure they work properly and efficiently and meet modern standards. If any services are turned off, the surveyor will state that in the report and will not turn them on Mains electricity supply. The meter and fuse board are located at a high level cupboard within the ground floor lobby.
Gas	Accessible parts of the system were visually inspected without removing fittings. No tests whatsoever were carried out to the system or appliances. Visual inspection does not assess any services to make sure they work properly and efficiently and meet modern standards. If any services are turned off, the surveyor will state that in the report and will not turn them on There is a Calor gas supply to the hob to the kitchen. The bottle and regulators are located to the rear.
Water, plumbing, bathroom fittings	Visual inspection of the accessible pipework, water tanks, cylinders and fittings without removing any insulation
	No tests whatsoever were carried out to the system or appliances Mains water supply. We did not locate the incoming rising main but suspect it is located in the kitchen. Plumbing supplies where viewed are in copper, wastes are in plastic and cast iron. There is a plastic cold water storage tank in the roof space to the rear.
	Bathroom fittings are modern and comprise of a ceramic wc, ceramic wash hand basin and an acrylic bath. There is an electric shower over the bath.
Heating and hot water	Accessible parts of the system were visually inspected apart from communal systems, which were not inspected
	No tests whatsoever were carried out to the system or appliances Central heating is provided by an oil fired boiler located within the garage which heats steel radiators throughout the property. There is a programmer located within the kitchen. Radiators also have TRVs.
	Hot water is heated and stored in a copper cylinder located within a cupboard to the rear left hand bedroom. Hot water can be heated by the oil boiler or the stove to the living room. There is a plastic oil storage tank to the rear of the garage.
Drainage	Drainage covers etc were not lifted Neither drains nor drainage systems were tested Drainage connects to the mains system.
Fire, smoke and burglar alarms	Visually inspected No tests whatsoever were carried out to the system or appliances There are no fire or burglar alarms. There are smoke detectors in places.
	Fire Safety Legislation effective from February 2022 requires a smoke alarm to be installed in the room most frequently used for living purposes and in every circulation space on each floor. A heat detection alarm must be installed in every kitchen area and all smoke and heat alarms must be ceiling mounted and interlinked. Where there is a carbon fuelled appliance e.g. central heating boiler, open fire, wood burning stove, etc, a carbon monoxide detector is also required. The purchaser(s) should appraise themselves of the requirements of this legislation and engage with appropriate accredited contractors to ensure compliance.

# PART 1 - GENERAL

#### 1.1 THE SURVEYORS

The Seller has engaged the Surveyors to provide the Single Survey Report. The Seller has also engaged the Surveyors to provide an Energy Report in the format prescribed by the accredited Energy Company.

Once the Seller has conditionally accepted an offer to purchase made in writing, the Purchaser's lender or conveyancer may request that the Surveyors provide general comment on standard appropriate supplementary documentation. In the event of a significant amount of documentation being provided to the Surveyors, an additional fee may be incurred by the Purchaser. Any additional fee will be agreed in writing.

If information is provided to the Surveyors during the conveyancing process which materially affects the valuation stated in the Report, the Surveyors reserve the right to reconsider the valuation. Where the Surveyors require to amend the valuation in consequence of such information, they will issue an amended Report to the Seller. It is the responsibility of the Seller to ensure that the amended Report is transmitted to every prospective Purchaser.

The individual Surveyor will be a member of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors who is competent to survey, value and report upon Residential Property<sup>1</sup>.

The Surveyors accept no responsibility or liability whatsoever in relation to the Report to persons other than the Seller and the Purchaser. The Seller and Purchaser should be aware that if a Lender seeks to rely on this Report they do so at their own risk. #### 1.4 INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

# **PART 2 - DESCRIPTION OF THE REPORT**

#### 2.1 THE SERVICE

The Single Survey is a Report by an independent Surveyor, prepared in an objective way regarding the condition and value of the Property on the day of the inspection, and who is a member of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors. It includes an Energy Report as required by Statute and this is in the format of the accredited Energy Company.

#### 2.2 THE INSPECTION

The Inspection is a general surface examination of those parts of the Property which are accessible: in other words, visible and readily available for examination from ground and floor levels, without risk of causing damage to the Property or injury to the Surveyor.

All references to visual inspection refer to an inspection from within the property at floor level and from ground level within the site and adjoining public areas, without the need to move any obstructions. Any references to left or right are taken facing the front of the property.

The Inspection is carried out with the Seller's permission, without causing damage to the building or contents. Furniture, stored items and insulation are not moved.

#### 2.3 THE REPORT

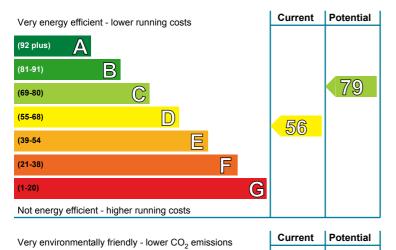

### The energy efficiency rating of your home

### About the recommended measures to improve your home's performance rating

This section offers additional information and advice on the recommended improvement measures for your home

#### 1 Cavity wall insulation

Cavity wall insulation, to fill the gap between the inner and outer layers of external walls with an insulating material, reduces heat loss; this will improve levels of comfort, reduce energy use and lower fuel bills. The insulation material is pumped into the gap through small holes that are drilled into the outer walls, and the holes are made good afterwards. As specialist machinery is used to fill the cavity, a professional installation company should carry out this work, and they should carry out a thorough survey before commencing work to ensure that this type of insulation is suitable for this home and its exposure. They should also provide a guarantee for the work and handle any building standards issues. Further information about cavity wall insulation and details of local installers can be obtained from the National Insulation Association (www.nationalinsulationassociation.org.uk).

#### 2 Floor insulation (suspended floor)

Insulation of a floor will significantly reduce heat loss; this will improve levels of comfort, reduce energy use and lower fuel bills. Suspended floors can often be insulated from below but must have adequate ventilation to prevent dampness; seek advice about this if unsure. Further information about floor insulation is available from many sources including www.energysavingtrust.org.uk/scotland/Insulation/Floor-insulation. Building regulations generally apply to this work so it is best to check with your local authority building standards department.

#### 3 Heating controls (room thermostat)

The heating system should have a room thermostat to enable the boiler to switch off when no heat is required. A competent heating engineer should be asked to do this work. Insist that the thermostat switches off the boiler as well as the pump and that the thermostatic radiator valve is removed from any radiator in the same room as the thermostat. Building regulations generally apply to this work and a building warrant may be required, so it is best to check with your local authority building standards department and seek advice from a qualified heating engineer.

#### 4 Solar water heating

A solar water heating panel, usually fixed to the roof, uses the sun to pre-heat the hot water supply. This can significantly reduce the demand on the heating system to provide hot water and hence save fuel and money. Planning permission might be required, building regulations generally apply to this work and a building warrant may be required, so it is best to check these with your local authority. You could be eligible for Renewable Heat Incentive payments which could appreciably increase the savings beyond those shown on your EPC, provided that both the product and the installer are certified by the Microgeneration Certification Scheme (or equivalent). Details of local MCS installers are available at www.microgenerationcertification.org.

#### 5 Solar photovoltaic (PV) panels

A solar PV system is one which converts light directly into electricity via panels placed on the roof with no waste and no emissions. This electricity is used throughout the home in the same way as the electricity purchased from an energy supplier. Planning permission might be required, building regulations generally apply to this work and a building warrant may be required, so it is best to check with your local authority. The assessment does not include the effect of any Feed-in Tariff which could appreciably increase the savings that are shown on this EPC for solar photovoltaic panels, provided that both the product and the installer are certified by the Microgeneration Certification Scheme (or equivalent). Details of local MCS installers are available at www.microgenerationcertification.org.

#### Low and zero carbon energy sources

Low and zero carbon (LZC) energy sources are sources of energy that release either very little or no carbon dioxide into the atmosphere when they are used. Installing these sources may help reduce energy bills as well as cutting carbon.
